He writes extensively on the economics of population aging and social security reform, especially in East Asia, and is the author or co-author of numerous policy studies, including *Global Aging and the Future of Emerging Markets* (2011); *The Global Aging Preparedness Index* (2010); *China's Long March to Retirement Reform* (2009); and *The Aging of Korea* (2007). He began his tenure at CSIS in October 2002 as a research intern with GAI and was subsequently promoted to research assistant in August 2003, to research associate in November 2004, to assistant director and fellow in January 2009. He has held the current position since March 2011. Nakashima holds an M.A. in international relations from the Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs at Syracuse University and a B.A. in Anglo-American studies from Kobe City University of Foreign Studies.
